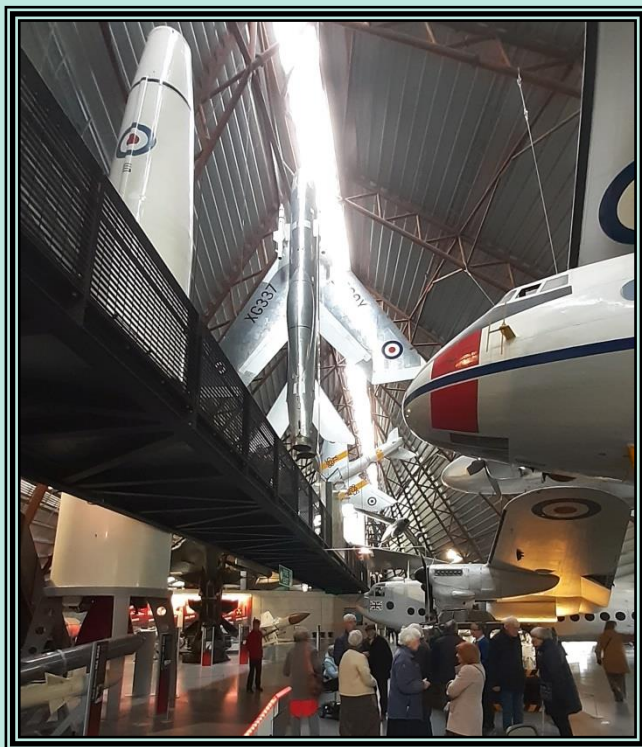

Data Protection Policy

The North Staffordshire National Trust Association (NSNTA) is a non-profit voluntary organisation which endeavours to comply with the principles of the Data Protection Act 1998, and the General Data Protection Regulation (GDPR) of May 2018.

Personal data collected by us on membership forms, renewal forms and event booking forms will be limited to: names, addresses, email addresses and telephone numbers. It will only be used for: administration of membership, communication of information and organisation of events within and related to the NSNTA.

Personal data will not be shared with the National Trust or any third party, or to other members.

Membership lists are destroyed when 18 months old. Lists relating to specific events are destroyed when the event is complete.

Contact the Membership Secretary if you wish to view/amend/delete any of your personal data.

By providing personal data on our membership forms and event booking forms, you are consenting to this, our Data Protection Policy, and to our stated use of your personal data.

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In order to comply with the terms of GDPR and to improve security and privacy the following policies are being adopted with particular reference to the publishing of details of members organising events. Full leaders' postal addresses will only appear on the booking forms and not in the main text of the magazine, which will just carry email addresses and telephone numbers. The booking forms are included in Newsletters distributed to bona-fide members of NSNTA but will not be contained in copies of the Newsletter posted on the website. Access to back copies of the Newsletter on the website which contain leaders' addresses will be restricted by password, available to members on request.

Attendees of NSNTA events are advised that they may be included in group photographs for publication in the Newsletter or on the website, but they will not be named without their specific permission. If anyone does not want to appear in such photographs, please let the organiser or the editor know.

This garden festival is one of my favourite events of the year, a great day out for everyone who likes plants, gardens, crafts, food and fun. In addition to entry to the numerous horticultural stalls and marquees, visitors will also be able to explore the Hall itself and to tour the stunning gardens, with their famous double, herbaceous beds. Garden tours throughout the day are led by the owner, Lord Ashbrook and the Head Gardener and are included in the ticket as are a programme of talks and demonstrations. Experts from The Professional Gardeners' Guild will be on hand to answer any questions you may have.

High quality garden accessories, crafts and gifts will also be available to purchase and a selection of food and drink outlets will satisfy all tastes. In the morning, the Wabash Jazz Trio will provide entertainment followed by the Lymm Concert band in the afternoon.

## **Sunday 14<sup>th</sup> July: Walk: Little Moreton Hall circular ramble.**

Four and a half miles, easy walking, no hills, eight stiles.

This walk starts and finishes at Little Moreton Hall, a favourite and special place for many of us. We will head off in to the Cheshire countryside, taking a loop to Scholar Green then a second loop back to the hall for lunch and/or a chance to tour the hall again.

We will meet on the main car park for an 11am start, and expect to return by around 1.30pm. The walk is about 4.5 miles, all on level ground though there are about eight stiles to negotiate. It's a mixture of grassy fields, quiet roads and canal towpath. We do need to cross the busy A34 road twice, with appropriate care – away from this road we soon find the peace of countryside.



Landmarks en route include Rode Hall, All Saints Church Scholar Green, and Ransdell Hall. The

latter predates the Macclesfield canal which now runs across the bottom of their front lawn – perhaps uniquely, the then owners came to an agreement with the canal company who, as compensation for the loss of unimpeded views, erected a decorative fence along the canal. This fence is still there 197 years later, well maintained, and at least a quarter of a mile long.

This event could suit couples where one enjoys walking and one does not or can not. Little Moreton Hall can easily entertain one partner for a couple of hours while the other takes their exercise!

Suggested donation for the walk is £3.00 for members, £4.00 for guests, payable on the day. Children and well-behaved dogs are welcome at no charge. Dogs are not permitted anywhere inside the hall.

## Wednesday 24th July: Car Trip: Dorfold Hall Nr. Nantwich.

Dorfold Hall is a magnificent brick and stone gabled, Grade 1 listed, Jacobean House, located on the outskirts of Nantwich. It was built in 1616 by Sir Roger Wilbraham whose family still own and live in the property. It is surrounded by gardens and extensive woodland making it a delightful country house to visit.



The exquisite interiors retain their original spectacular plaster ceilings and elegant oak panelling. The Drawing Room boasts an original barrel vaulted ceiling dating back to 1621, the work of renowned Venetian plasterers.

In 1771, the architect Samuel Wyatt re-designed the downstairs of the house and in 1863 William Nesfield was commissioned to re-landscape the lake and grounds, resulting in a magnificent approach to the house.

This will be an afternoon visit to this gem of a property.

Please note that there is an uneven cobbled courtyard on the approach to the entrance to the house and many steps in the house!

Meet at 2:00 pm for tea/coffee and cake before our guided tour of the house.

Cost: £20 p.p. (non-members £21) for refreshments and the guided tour, and then we are free to wander around the gardens and woodland walks.

Reviews of Recent Events

Tuesday 19th December: Christmas Lunch at The Swan With Two Necks.

When thinking about where to hold the Christmas lunch in 2023, when we were in a car passing the “Swan with Two Necks” in Blackbrook we decided to pop in and have a look to see if they had a room suitable for our needs. The manager showed us to a cosy room off the main restaurant and we booked it.

Later, just before our lunch was due to take place, I had a phone call to say that there was a new restaurant manager who thought that the room we had been allocated was too small for our needs and we would be rather cramped with pillars obscuring the view for some tables. He suggested that we take advantage of the new ‘tipi’ they had just installed, principally to host wedding receptions. There is normally a cost to use this facility but, for us, it would be free of charge. Initially I thought it would be much too cold for an event in December so off we went to have a look. However we were pleasantly surprised to find it warm and welcoming with a huge heater outside the tent.



The room was well decorated and it was certainly a very different type of venue for the 60 plus Association members who came and enjoyed our Christmas meal.

Where will we go in 2024? All suggestions are welcome.

Tuesday 16th January: Talk: Bill Klemperer - "His Work".

Mr. Klemperer, a Fellow of the Society of Antiquities, is a recently retired archaeologist who worked as a Principal Inspector of Ancient Monuments for Historic England for the Midlands and the Welsh Borders.

Looking after ancient monuments plays a big role in increasing economic activity, promoting investment, business growth and tourism. Many are in dire straits; in 2021 10% of Scheduled monuments were on the Heritage at risk list. Mr. Klemperer's work had many facets including land and planning, repair and restoration, protecting and working on archaeological sites, and being involved with treasure troves.

Historic monument records are maintained by local councils, so a field evaluation is needed to inform the local plan although many sites don't have a local plan due to lack of resources. It was proposed to build an industrial area close to the M54 near a Roman hill fort but an evaluation of the site discovered Roman marching camps so the development was not permitted. At Nescliffe Iron Age hill fort near Shrewsbury it was discovered that tree roots were damaging the site so tree clearance took place and the area was restored to heathland.

Wroxeter was the fourth largest city in Roman Britain where it was decided to build a platform for a restored Roman villa to protect it and the site below. He was also involved with sites at White Ladies Priory next to Boscobel House, Much Wenlock Priory, and at Hulton Abbey where medieval tiles needed preservation. At Ironbridge specialist funding was needed for laser scanning.

He gave us an insight into the various archaeological techniques: LIDAR, Light detection and Ranging, targets a surface with a laser and measures the time for the reflected light to return to the receiver enabling detailed mapping.

Radio Carbon has a half-life of 5000 years and the oldest dates that can be reliably measured date to 50,000 years ago by which time 99% of the carbon has decayed.

Aerial photography shows variations in growth of vegetation indicating where infilling is less compact. This is complemented by a Geophysical examination of the ground which measures resistance, a high resistance suggesting a wall whereas a low resistance means a ditch. Magnetometry is useful for finding hearths and bread ovens. Laser scanning gives a very helpful 3D image. He then gave details along with illustrations of excavations at several castles on the Welsh borders. In 1996 Wigmore castle was poorly preserved so all the vegetation was removed from the walls then the tops were covered with turf as it acts as a thermal blanket. Hopton Castle west of Ludlow was very overgrown and falling down and negotiations with the landowner led to Lottery funding

being obtained to preserve the site. At Kilpeck, south of Hereford, a site well known for its Romanesque church, a Motte and Bailey castle was found. The shell of the keep was in danger of falling down, so inclined ground anchors of the highest quality steel were inserted.

Mr. Klemperer and the treasure valuation committee decide the worth of precious metals found by metal detectorists, including, of course, the Staffordshire Hoard.

A very interesting evening with a comprehensive presentation of the role of the archaeologist.

Tuesday 20th February: Talk: William Durose - "Sixteen in the Sixties"

Having been a teenager in the '60's, I was looking forward to going back in time with Bill Durose and I was not disappointed.

Memories came flooding back as Bill, with his love of '60's music, evoked a much simpler, pre-computer life by talking, singing and playing his guitar, highlighting the key events, TV programmes and hit songs of each year of the decade.

Bill invited us to sing along to well-known tunes like "Living Doll" and "Travelling Light" and entertained us with personal recollections of visits to the Potteries and Leek by new groups such as the Beatles and the Rolling Stones. The Beatles appeared at Trentham Gardens on 11 October 1963 (Bill was there!) and just a few weeks later they flew to New York and became world famous.

Among his memories were the advent of Radio Luxembourg, licensed betting shops, Coronation Street, Lewis's in Hanley ('62), the BT Tower in London ('65), Radio Stoke ('68) and the folk music of Bob Dylan with "Blowing in the Wind" in 1966. Saturdays were spent sampling discs in Sherwin's music shop in Hanley.

We were tested on our ability to recognise hit numbers and performers from introductory guitar chords and to identify advertising slogans for household items such as soaps and cigarettes.

In 1963, Beeching announced cuts of train lines here and President Kennedy was shot. In 1964 Harold Wilson was our Prime Minister, Winston Churchill died in 1965. Abortion was legalised in 1968.

It was a nostalgic and very enjoyable reminder of the much-loved decade as well as a lovely trip down memory lane.

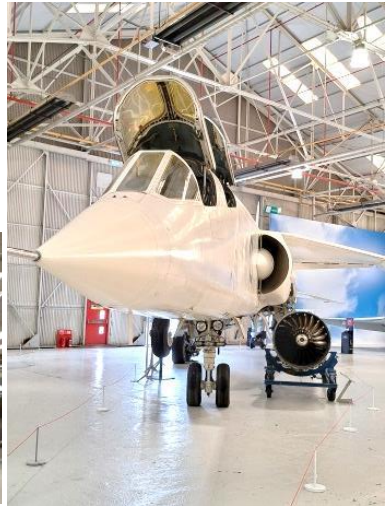
Thursday 7th March: Car Trip: RAF Cosford Museum and Cold War Exhibition guided tour.

This car trip directed us to the RAF Museum Midlands, based in RAF Cosford.

The museum is regarded in high esteem by aviation buffs as holding one of the premier aircraft collections not only in the UK but worldwide.

We were split into two groups and our group guide, Stuart, presented a very interesting history lecture on the Cold War, its protagonists, incidents, outcomes and equipment involved.

Starting off from the well-appointed visitor centre, we made a short detour to Hangar 2 to have a look at the impressive TSR-2, (one of many projects cancelled at great expense before entering service) before we made our way to take in the purpose of our visit.



The Cold War Exhibition is held in a purpose built building, which reflecting its predominantly aviation theme appears to be designed to look like an oversized aerofoil. Inside, one cannot fail to be impressed by the array of aircraft displayed. Ranging from V bombers, interceptors, fighters and transport aircraft. Some of these aircraft were suspended from the rafters in flying poses, so realistically you could view aircraft from above, below and laterally. Armaments displayed



included terrifying nuclear weapons, free fall bombs, guided missiles and so on. Furthermore, the display also contains non-aviation related artefacts of the Cold War era, such as armoured fighting vehicles, posters, uniforms, mannequins of Soviet Cold War leaders and lots more. If you want



to delve into the dark world of espionage, subterfuge and propaganda this is the place to start.

Though British aircraft are predominantly displayed, aircraft built by the USA and

the Soviets are on display and as exhibits, just as impressive as our own aircraft.

To each exhibit that was pointed out to us came a commentary of some of its finer facts, nuances and campaigns that it either participated in or defended. So we saw equipment from many campaigns including the Korean War, Berlin Airlift, Cuban Crisis, Falklands Campaign, Gulf War and more.



Due to time constraints, not the whole of the Cold War Display was covered by our guide, but we were more than welcome to investigate on our own, which many of us willingly did.

As a venue and a museum exhibition site, I would thoroughly recommend a follow up visit. The

whole site is people friendly, wheelchair friendly and there are plenty of museum staff to help you enjoy your day. All the exhibits have information boards, some have interactive displays, not forgetting that there are other hangars with their own themed displays.







I first visited RAF Cosford in the 70's and every visit since I have seen something different.

Tuesday 19th March: Talk: Susan Munro – Elizabeth’s Group

We had a talk with a film about the campaign to gain recognition for “the Congleton Suffragist”, Elizabeth Wolstenholme Elmy, who has now had a statue erected in her memory at Bridge Street, Congleton. Elizabeth lived from 1833 right through to 1918, and was involved in campaigns for many important women’s issues, against the Contagious Diseases Act, for the Married Women’s Property Act, and finally for women’s votes before the First World War. She spent many years, firstly as a pioneer of girls’ education in Salford and in Moody Street, Congleton, later as a parliamentary lobbyist and an indefatigable writer of letters to MPs. Emmeline Pankhurst described her as “the brains behind the movement” for women’s suffrage. A pacifist as well as a secularist and a feminist, she eventually parted company with the Suffragettes over their use of terrorist tactics, but even in 1913 her achievements were recognized when the Women’s Suffrage Pilgrimage, organised by the National Union of Women’s Suffrage Societies, while passing through Cheshire and Staffordshire, paid tribute to the Oldest Suffragist by visiting her at Congleton.

It is good that her memory should not be forgotten in modern Congleton, despite the higher profile that the Pankhurst family have had over the years!
