

ARRANGEMENTS FOR TRIPS



Coaches depart promptly from SCHOOL STREET, Newcastle, which has become available again, behind the Jubilee Swimming Baths. Nearby long-stay parking. Should a member cancel their booking it is regretted that reimbursement is only possible if there is a waiting list. There will be a £2 per cheque handling charge. Members are requested not to find their own replacement. Non-members taking part in our trips will pay an additional £2 for coach outings and an additional £1 for car outings. The committee has agreed that it is only fair that members should have priority when booking trips and holidays.

Members are asked to note that it is not possible for the coach to stop at places other than School Street to pick people up or drop them off on the outward or return journeys. The coach will not wait for members who are late, either at School Street or at other pick up points. Members are advised to take careful note of when or where they will be picked up. Anyone missing a coach will have no claim on the Association.

Cheques to be made payable to the “The North Staffs National Trust Association”. Due to current banking procedure, please note that cheques are not cleared until after an event. Members are asked to write a separate cheque for each event they book. **Note:** The committee does not consider it proper that an event should incur a loss and therefore reserves the right to cancel should there be insufficient support.


Monday 21st May Car outing to Capesthorpe Hall.
(between Congleton and Alderley Edge, Cheshire, SK11 9JY.)

The present squire of Capesthorpe Hall is Sir William Bromley-Davenport, the former Lord Lieutenant of Cheshire, whose family have owned the land since Domesday times when they were appointed custodians of the Royal Forest of Macclesfield.

In his book *'England's Thousand Best Houses'*, Simon Jenkins states that Lenette

Bromley-Davenport, the American mother of the present squire, wrote in 1955 that Capesthorpe *'can repel violently or attract irrevocably. To many the exotic towers, domes and pinnacles are grotesque and ugly [but] the enchantment of Eastern minarets, the tales of Arabian nights and the romance of the Round Table trembles in the air'*.

Members will be given a guided tour of the house and may walk around the gardens at leisure. Refreshments at members' own expense are available in the tearoom, which closes at 5.00 pm. Members should arrive not later than 1.30 pm, the car park is only a short walk from the house.

Highfields is a black and white Yeoman's Manor. The land was owned by the Dod family, apparently since Saxon times, and they built the present house in 1645. It passed by marriage to the architect William Baker in 1736 and is still owned by the Baker family. The house has been added to over the years, without detracting from its cosy charm, all the downstairs rooms and the hall having fine fireplaces.

Highfields features in Simon Jenkins book entitled *England's Thousand Best Houses*.

Members should arrive at Highfields not later than 2.30 pm when they will be given a guided tour of the house followed by tea/coffee and biscuits

Tuesday 12th June Car outing to Sugnall Walled Garden.

One of Staffordshire's hidden gems lies just a few miles west of Eccleshall, Sugnall Walled Garden. Built in 1738 to serve as a kitchen garden to Sugnall Hall, its two acres are still surrounded by the original brick walls, making it unique in the country. After a period of Victorian glory, the garden followed the usual 20th century pattern of decay from which it has been rescued by the current owners, Mr and Mrs Jacques, who are also experts in historic garden restoration. Since 2006, the garden has undergone an extensive restoration and replanting programme and now produces an abundance of organic fruit and vegetables, some of which you will sample this evening.

Join us for a summer evening stroll through the garden in the company of the owners who will tell us more of its history and their plans for its future. We will also visit some of the adjacent garden buildings and the site of the now demolished Hall. All this will be followed by a delicious supper of seasonal quiche and salad and a fruit pudding all fresh from the garden. Tea or coffee is included and further wine can be purchased.

Saturday 23rd June Coach outing to Shobdon Church, Flower, Food & Wine Festival and Witley Court.

Today is a day for those with a taste for distinguishing rococo from baroque or barolo and hock.

Shobdon Church near Leominster is unique in Britain . Visually unaltered since 1756, it is a Wedgwood blue and white rococo masterpiece, looking as fresh as the flowers after the recently completed (D.V.) million pound restoration. The elegant grounds of the missing mansion form the backdrop of the no less splendid 30th Annual Festival of Food & Wine. Peace and quiet can be found in the Arboretum and Lakeside Walk. Tea or coffee and a bakery item (included) will be provided on arrival. The refreshment facilities and purveyors of delicacies will be pleased to furnish lunch in exchange for currency, or please bring sustenance with you.

From Shobdon we will move on to Witley Court. Our guided tour of the palatial remains concludes with a firing of the Poseidon & Flora fountains . There will be time to visit the Italianate Church which, like Shobdon, gives no clue as to the magnificence within. Lord Foley did rather well at the reclamation auction of the fittings in the distressed Duke of Chandos' Chapel. If the tallest funerary monument in Britain, by Rysbrack, is not to your taste, the grounds at Witley also feature the Jerwood Sculpture Park.

After all this, relax with a strawberry tea (included), served, not queued for, in the tropical conservatory waiting exclusively for you. We shall leave at 4.45.p.m. to be back in Newcastle by 7p.m.

Wednesday 27th June Walk: Alderley Edge

Alderley Edge is a dramatic, wooded sandstone escarpment, which has been mined for copper for at least 4,000 years. Bronze Age miners were followed by the Romans, mediaeval smelters and finally, with the arrival of the railway system, Cornish tin miners. They have all left their marks on the landscape, now in the safe care of the National Trust.



Our walk will be a gentle affair with several stops to take in the views, the mines, and other points of interest. It is just four miles in total, six stiles, and only one steepish slope to go up.

We will meet at 10am on the NT car park by the Wizard Inn (parking free if you are displaying your sticker), and expect to be back at the Wizard for lunch at 12.15.

After lunch, why not make a day of it – either go on a short distance to Hare Hill Garden (NT), well worth a visit at this time of year, or perhaps the delights of shopping in Wilmslow or Cheadle Hulme will draw you in?

Thursday 12th July: Coach outing to The Hall at Abbey-Cwm Hir, near Llandrindod Wells.

The Grade II listed Hall at Abbey-cwm-Hir (the Abbey in the Long Valley) is situated between Newtown and Llandrindod Wells in the old Welsh county of Radnorshire. It is a fine example of Victorian Gothic Revival architecture, built in 1834 by Thomas Wilson and restored by its present owners to its former splendour. It overlooks the parish church of St Mary and the ruins of a 12th century Cistercian abbey.

The Hall has 52 rooms, all with original features including marble fireplaces, decorative plasterwork and stained glass. The many bedrooms and bathrooms are themed to days gone by and together with the formal reception rooms and unique Garden Room they house a wide selection of collectibles and memorabilia, with some surprises! The grounds cover some 12 acres including a large walled garden, lawns, terraces and a lake with waterfall set against woodland. All the rooms and grounds are accessible by visitors, as is the adjacent parish church.



This will be one of our rare outings to mid-Wales with a journey time a little longer than usual compensated for by a scenic route with no motorways. We will drive directly to the Hall but the coach will have on-board toilet facilities. On arrival we will be served tea/coffee/biscuits before commencing a full tour of the Hall, led at a leisurely pace by members of the family. All rooms have some seating for visitors and the large Garden Room is available to relax in. **The rooms are luxuriously carpeted and visitors are asked to take soft footwear (house slippers or similar) to change into for the duration of the tour.**

At the conclusion of the tour (2.00 pm approx.) we will have lunch. Members may bring their own packed lunch to eat in either the Garden Room or on the outside terraces. However, a seated Hall Buffet, which is highly recommended, is available at an additional cost of £9 per head. See footnote for details. **The buffet must be ordered and paid for at the time of booking.**

After lunch we are free to explore the grounds and the church, reached by a short walk around the lake. We will leave for home at approx. 4.30pm. Coach departs from School Street at 8.15 am prompt and arrives back at approx. 7.15 pm.

Tuesday 24th July Car outing to Pugin Land, St Giles Cheadle, ST10 1AR

Celebrate the bi-centenary of the birth of architect Augustus Welby Northmore Pugin with a visit to Cheadle, home of perhaps his most magnificent creation, St Giles R.C. church. Built with funds provided by the 16th Earl of Shrewsbury, this parish church is decorated with the richness of a cathedral with glowing paintings, intricate carvings and superb stained glass and Minton tiles. In addition to a guided tour of this wonderful building we shall have a presentation on 'Pugin in North Staffordshire', a tour of Lulworth House (the former police station now being used as Cheadle Heritage Centre for the duration of the Pugin year) and the RIBA and Harman collections and a short guided architectural walk around Cheadle historic town centre.

We shall meet at 10.30 at Lulworth House when tea/coffee will be served and the day will end at approximately 3.15pm; there will be a break around midday when members can take lunch (at own expense) at one of the cafes or pubs in the town.

**Thursday 2nd August Car outing to Tabley House.
Knutsford, WA16 OHB**

Tabley House, which was designed by John Carr of York for Sir Peter Byrne Leicester Bt., is the only 18th century Palladian country house in Cheshire. The earlier Tabley Hall circa 1380 was built nearby in the middle of a mere called The Moat. Unfortunately, the Old Hall became unsafe and had to be demolished in the 1920s. However, St. Peter's Chapel dating from 1675-8 and "The Old Hall Room" which were both part of the Old Hall were rebuilt next to the new Tabley House. The Old Hall Room is now the Tea Room and this connects the Chapel to Tabley House. Tabley is renowned for its art and furniture collections with paintings by Turner, Lely, William Dobson, John Martin, Reynolds and Fuseli and furniture by Gillow amongst others. The conducted tour of the house will commence at 2.00 pm and lasts approximately one and a quarter hours after which we will take afternoon tea in the Old Hall Tearoom. Full directions and timings will be given upon application. Please note that the collections are housed on the first floor and if anyone needs assistance with the stairs I have to notify the staff prior to our visit. If you would need such assistance please indicate so on your booking form.

Since this is an afternoon visit, some people may wish to spend some time in nearby Knutsford in the morning; this is where Mrs Gaskell lived at one time and is the setting for her famous novel *Cranford*.

Thursday 16th August Coach outing to Bitterley Court, The Food Centre and Oakly Park near Ludlow.

A rare opportunity to visit two contrasting private houses on the outskirts of Ludlow.

Bitterley Court : an ancient settlement with a polite, Georgian facade concealing a mysterious core. Adjacent Saxon Church . Only two families have owned it since the fourteenth century, each generation leaving its mark .

Oakly Park : the spectacular result of a partnership between a well informed, well travelled patron and his like-minded genius architect given his first country house commission. The dramatic regency core of the house was unusually inserted last linking two earlier properties. The home of the son of Clive of India and his descendants the Windsor – Clives, currently the heir to Lord Plymouth .

Ludlow Food Centre : a mind blowing gourmet experience. If the produce is local or can be made on the premises, bakery, patisserie, cheese making and master chocolatier, it's all here.

Notes : The Food centre is our base . We shall call in for a comfort stop on the way to Bitterley Court . We have exclusive use of the conference room for lunch, departure point for Oakly Park and returning for afternoon tea and retail therapy. The conference room is available for those bringing their own lunch and tea or coffee if required is available in situ for £2.25. If you prefer, a carnivore or vegetarian sandwich and seasonal salads buffet, potato salad, coleslaw, garden salad, crisps, tea and coffee is being prepared for us. Please see the booking form. Upon our return from Oakly Park tea or coffee and cake (included) will be served.

The Optional Lunch, at a preferential rate, for those not self catering has been arranged to avoid queues in the excellent but small, and in August, crowded Barn Cafe .

Saturday 15th September Coach outing to Buckingham Palace. A Diamond Day Out

Celebrate the Diamond Jubilee with a visit to Buckingham Palace, the office and London residence of H.M.The Queen, one of the few working palaces in the world. You will visit **the State Rooms, the Garden** and the spectacular special exhibition: **Diamonds, A Jubilee Celebration.**

The State Rooms form the heart of the working palace and are furnished with some of the greatest treasures from the Royal Collection – paintings by Rembrandt, Rubens and Canaletto; sculpture by Canova; exquisite examples of Sevres porcelain and some of the finest English and French furniture

Described as a “walled oasis in the middle of London”, the Garden is home to thirty different species of birds and more than 350 different wild flowers, some extremely rare. Visitors end their tour with a walk along the south side of the garden, with splendid views of the west front of the palace and the famous lake.

The spectacular special exhibition: **Diamonds, A Jubilee Celebration** shows the many ways in which diamonds have been used by British monarchs over the last 200 years. It includes a number of the Queen’s personal jewels - those inherited by Her Majesty or acquired during her reign. The exhibition reveals how many of these extraordinary stones have undergone a number of transformations having been re-cut or incorporated into new settings during their fascinating history

At the end of your visit, you might like to visit the Garden Café situated on the West Terrace overlooking the famous lawn and lake. The café offers a selection of refreshments, including tea, coffee, juice and a selection of cakes and sandwiches, all in a most elegant setting.

A talk by Fiona Wallace

Behind the Scenes at the New Vic – The Producer's Perspective

For 25 years the New Vic Theatre has been producing exciting and acclaimed theatre from its base in Newcastle-under-Lyme. In the run up to the opening night of the theatre's new adaptation of Thomas Hardy's *Far From the Madding Crowd*, Executive Director, Fiona Wallace, will present a backstage insight into just what it takes to produce a theatre show, from the choice of plays and directors, to casting the acting company and on through the rehearsal process. She will take a behind-the-scenes look at the work of the Costume department and the Scenic and Props workshops, culminating in the energy and activity of technical and dress rehearsals and the excitement (and tension?) of opening night.

Our Constitution requires us to elect a new committee annually and, while we already have a strong team, each of whom are willing to stand for re-election, we would really welcome new blood.

Reports of previous activities

Monday 14th November – Talk at the NS Conference Centre:
David Beckett – What a Load of Rubbish! Recycling in Borough of Newcastle-under-Lyme.

David used plenty of visual aids to give us an interesting and informative insight into the problems of recycling in an environmentally friendly manner and of the impressive progress that Newcastle has made during the past few years. From recycling only about a quarter of collected waste a couple of years ago, and being near the bottom of the recycling “league table”, Newcastle now recycles fully half of its waste and is not only near the head of the table but has also won several national awards.

Much of this progress was made during David’s time as Newcastle Council’s Cabinet Member for Environment and Recycling and, although he is evidently proud of the achievement, he is typically modest about his contribution to it. Despite this improvement he is conscious of the need to progress further because, as he says, while a fifty percent recycling rate is excellent by the standards of the past, it means that we are still dumping fifty percent into landfill sites.



Newcastle’s recycling effort has not gone without criticism, with some local residents complaining about having to fill too many different containers with their waste; indeed

there has been an attempt at ridicule in at least one national daily newspaper. David counters this by pointing out that not all the containers have to be put out at the kerb side on any single collection day and that one of them never needs to be put out at all. More importantly, segregating waste at source reduces processing costs thereby saving significant amounts of money for council tax payers; furthermore it avoids contaminating “clean” waste which, once fouled, would no longer be recyclable and would have to go to landfill.

Further consideration has been given to the environment by ensuring that Newcastle has reduced its “waste miles” by arranging that rubbish travels minimal distances to processing centres. Most of these are in neighbouring counties, at least one is in Staffordshire and one is even within the borough.

Tuesday and Wednesday 13th & 14th December Visit to Ford Green Hall

On a chilly Tuesday evening in December, what a pleasure it was to visit Ford Green Hall, where we were welcomed by the aroma of festive spices.

The timber-framed structure was constructed in 1624 by a local craftsman, Raphe Sutton, carpenter, for Hugh Ford, a wealthy yeoman farmer. Raphe Sutton's name remains to this day inscribed on the lintel above the porch door. The Hall was the Ford family home for nearly 200 years although in the ensuing years, it was extended to include a porch, a separate kitchen and two additional wings to meet the changing needs of the family.

The contents of the Hall are not original but similar to those that would have once furnished it. The tester bed in the Hall Chamber, originally from Norton Old Hall, has side curtains embroidered over many months by skilled local volunteers. In the Main Hall the focus is the cast iron fireplace purchased in 1952 for the princely sum of £6 from Alton Towers. The Hall was occupied until 1942, when it was purchased by Stoke City Council. It was subsequently opened to the public in 1946 after going through extensive restoration.

Our enthusiastic guide for the evening was Chris Bell, who, like all of the volunteers in attendance, was attired in Tudor costume. His tour was a catalogue of interesting facts. Throughout the evening we were entertained by Eric and Jane Moulder who played music of the renaissance period on a variety of wind instruments.

On display in the kitchen were a number of delicacies of the period, including a savoury mince pie, game birds and spices from around the world. Nicky told us how Christmas fare was prepared and demonstrated the making of marzipan. We were drawn upstairs by delightful festive smells, where Carolyn was making beautifully decorated pomanders for sale. Near by, Mary and Janice demonstrated their skills in wool spinning and embroidery.

A thoroughly enjoyable evening concluded with a glass of warm mulled wine and mince pies.

Tuesday 24th January 2012 Terry Butler - Talk at the NS Conference Centre: The ROYAL TRAIN.

As a railway enthusiast I was hoping to see photos of locomotives and the interiors of the Royal Train carriages. Not so. Was I disappointed? NO WAY!

There were some specific points. The first Royal Train ran in June 1842, but Terry stated that he was not involved with that one. Terry reckoned this was good going as today, with modern trains, it can still take 23hrs on a Sunday.

A new set of nine Bomb and Bullet proof carriages had been built a few years ago at a cost of £9m. Prince Charles had some input with the selection and design of the interiors. Terry said that it looked as though the Prince had been influenced by a visit to IKEA!

Train timings were critical to avoid delays, and the Queen was agreeable to alterations if needed. Not so the Duke. Plan A was Plan A and he caused much heart ache if things went wrong. This happened on one of the Duke's overnight trains. It was stabled on a secluded line with no trains scheduled to pass, only for every hour, on the hour, a heavily laden freight train went thundering past. He was not amused. There were many more such stories all evening.

In conclusion, the Queen does pay for the train. She paid £50,000 in 1986 when she opened our Garden Festival. Also all Train operations are scheduled so as not to interfere with Network operations.

Thursday 9th February : Car outing to the Staffordshire Record Office

A lucky 21 of us defied the snow forecast and were treated to a special behind-the-scenes look at the County Records Office in Stafford. This building, tucked away behind the William Salt Library in Eastgate Street, houses an amazing collection of documents and maps dating from the 11th century onwards. And not a dusty cobweb in sight!

We were welcomed by Rebecca Jackson, who gave us an insight into the range of material

stored, but more importantly available for inspection by anyone interested. Users of the Record Office range from academic researchers to legal searches and to individuals looking for information on their families, houses or local area. They have some 20,000 personal visitors a year.

The information is divided into collections. To name a few: the Sutherland Collection has much of local interest regarding the family and the Trentham Estate; the Police Collection, where you just might find a photo of one of your ancestors (the police were early adopters of the new technology in the 1800s, and kept mug shots of prisoners, habitual drunkards and the like!); the Coal Board Collection has plans of long-gone mines and descriptions of mine rescues; the Poor Law Collection details life in the workhouses (Rebecca was impressed when the North Staffs group guessed what “lobscouse” was on the menu!)

We split into groups: to see the painstaking work of the conservators, where we learnt how to glue parchment with warm gelatine and to make ink from oak apples; and to the strongrooms where the bulk of the material is kept.

Some highlights for me were: the will of Wulfric Spot from Burton Priory in the time of King Ethelred, the Maer Church marriage register entry of Charles Darwin and Emma Wedgwood, and the beautiful watercolour sketches of the Crimean War by Lt-Col Thomas Unett from Tittensor.

Thursday 14 February Talk by Ian Dudson on ‘My life as a Sheriff’

In his introduction to Ian Dudson our Chairman, David, told us that the Queen had recently invited Ian to become the 5th Lord Lieutenant of Staffordshire since the end of the Second World War with effect from 28th March. So before he had even started his talk he received an enthusiastic round of applause!

Ian Dudson gave us an interesting talk starting with the history of the role of the High Sheriff. They have been appointed annually by the sovereign for over 1,000 years. Collecting the “Family Rent” of £24 per annum was the forerunner of the Inland Revenue.

The sheriffs have many roles including seeing that justice is done in the courts. There were courts of account where the money was counted on a chequered cloth with counters – this is the origin of the Exchequer. Entertaining the monarchy was an expensive business – they were asked to provide banquets for weddings – all out of their own pockets. Only the rich could become sheriffs. Appointments were made using a list and the monarch then pricked the favoured name with a bodkin – holes being more difficult to alter than words. Sheriffs have an elaborate uniform. Today, knowing when to wear it can be a problem.

Turning up in full regalia and finding everyone else in casual dress is embarrassing. The badge has two swords – one blunt for mercy, one sharp for justice.

Only a few elaborate receptions are provided each year now. But many guests are received and escorted around the county. The Duke of Gloucester was taken to the arboretum at Alrewas on Armistice Day – a grey day but at 11.00 am the sun shone briefly through the stone gap to light up the memorial wreath.

Ian Dudson has walked all 1154 miles of the canal paths in Staffordshire raising £12,000 for his charity The Staffordshire Community Foundation.

The office of High Sheriff is still self-funded, which is why, he suggests it is still going after 1,000 years. But it is a great privilege and he is looking forward to his role as Lord Lieutenant of Staffordshire.
